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VIEWS THAT ARIZONA IS "SERIOUSLY OFF TRACK" MAY BE SUBSIDING

Phoenix, Arizona, August 1, 2002. Belief that Arizona is headed in the "right direction" improved modestly in July and now stands at 50 percent, compared to 45 percent in April. At the same time, the proportion of Arizona consumers who believe their state is "seriously off track" subsided to 34 from 36 percent. Men are the most convinced things are going well, while women are more skeptical.

The improved overall reading was registered at the same time that consumer confidence took a turn for the worse, a set of findings that suggest Arizonans look more favorably on the economic situation in this area than on the national economic picture.

This most recent survey also registers unmistakably partisan overtones. Thus, where Republicans are increasingly likely to characterize the state as headed in the right direction (57% compared to 48% in April), only 41 percent of Democrats agree, a level two points below what was registered in the spring.

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EDITOR'S NOTE: This Rocky Mountain Poll Arizona (2002-III-06) is based on 703 interviews with adults across Arizona, of which 537 interviews conducted were with registered voters, from July 10th through July 15th, 2002. Where necessary, figures for age, sex and race were weighted to bring them into line with their actual proportion in the population. In a sample of this size, one may say with 95 percent certainty that the results have a statistical precision of plus or minus 3.7 percent of what they would have been had the entire population been surveyed. The Rocky Mountain Poll is conducted by the Behavior Research Center of Arizona and is an independent and non-partisan research program sponsored by the Center.
