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<u>PUBLIC UNIMPRESSED WITH LEGISLATURE:</u> <u>VIEWS TOWARD GOVERNOR HULL SOFTEN</u> <u>IN FINAL HOURS</u>

Phoenix, Arizona, January 16, 2003. On the eve of inaugurating a new governor, Arizonans appeared to be softening their assessment of the Jane Hull administration but they retain very skeptical views of the state legislature.

Although still negative on balance, the depth of critical views toward Governor Hull softened from 38 to 32 percent and positive assessments rose to 24 from 21 percent between October 2002 and January 2003. Arizonans most critical of Governor Hull are concentrated in Maricopa County where the negative rating swells to 38 percent, compared to only 26 percent in other areas of the state.

Assessment of the job performance of the Arizona State Legislature, however, reveals little softening of views – 30 percent unfavorable to 19 percent favorable. These negative views are curious given the fact that in November voters returned control of both the state House and Senate to Republican legislators, yet today, a plurality of Democrats, Republicans and Independents maintain a sour view of the State Legislature.

In light of the somewhat peevish response of GOP legislative leaders to newly installed Democrat Governor Janet Napolitano's State of the State message, voters may wonder if the stage has already been set for several more years of partisan bickering. Whether they will blame any future bickering on the legislature or on the new governor remains to be seen, but there can be little doubt that leaders of the legislative majority were surprised by the forcefulness of Governor Napolitano's presentation and know they have an articulate governor with which to deal and one who may take her legislative agenda on the road to build voter support. If she is successful in such a campaign, legislative leaders may come to wish they enjoyed a broader base of esteem from the public when they launch their own side of the debate.

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The findings outlined in this report are based on a survey of 675 adults across Arizona conducted between January 3rd and January 7th, 2003, by the Behavior Research Center of Arizona as part of the Center's independent and non-partisan Rocky Mountain Poll series. 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EDITOR'S NOTE: This Rocky Mountain Poll Arizona (2003-I-02) is based on 675 telephone interviews with adults, conducted from January 3rd through January 7th, 2003 throughout Arizona. In the overall sample, one may say with 95 percent certainty that the results have a statistical precision of plus or minus 3.8 percent of what they would have been had the entire adult population been surveyed. The Rocky Mountain Poll is conducted by the Behavior Research Center of Arizona and is an independent and non-partisan research program.
