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## SENATORS McCAIN AND KYL DRAWING STRONG APPROVAL FROM ARIZONA VOTERS

Phoenix, Arizona. July 29, 2003. Arizonans flat like U.S. Senator John McCain. By a ratio of 68 percent to only eight percent, they rate his performance in Washington favorably. Within the ranks of his own party, 73 percent applaud his performance, but his support is bipartisan, as 67 percent of Democrats and 62 percent of Independents also like the job he is doing in the nation's capitol.
U.S. Senator Jon Kyl also experienced an improvement in his job rating this quarter, now standing at 49 percent favorable to only nine percent unfavorable. And as was seen with McCain, members of his own political party are impressed - 63 percent of Republics in the state saying he is doing a good job and barely four percent giving negative ratings. Among Republicans likely to vote, 54 percent rate Kol favorably compared to 10 percent who give him an unfavorable review.

Democrats are less impressed, but nonetheless are not strongly negative toward Senator Kyl; 40 percent like the job he is doing, while 12 percent rate his performance as poor. Among Independent voters, 45 percent are favorable in their ratings, while 15 percent are negative.

The findings outlined in this report are based on a survey of 701 adults across Arizona conducted between July $14^{\text {th }}$ and July $18^{\text {th }}, 2003$, by the Behavior Research Center of Arizona as part of the Center's independent and non-partisan Rocky Mountain Poll series. EDITOR'S NOTE: This Rocky Mountain Poll Arizona (2003-III-05) is based on 701 telephone interviews conducted J uly 14-18, 2003, with adults throughout Arizona. In a sample of this size, one may say with 95 percent certainty that the results have a statistical precision of plus or minus 3.77 percent of what they would have been had the entire adult population been surveyed. The registered voter sample includes 539 individuals and the margin of error for that sample is $+/-4.3$ percent. Margin of error for GOP sample is $+/-6.5$ and for the Democrat sample is $+/-$ 7.0.
