McCAIN JOB RATINGS IMPROVE; KYL NUMBERS SOFTEN TO LOWEST LEVEL SINCE 2000

Phoenix, Arizona, January 30, 2004. U.S. Senator John McCain continues to receive favorable job approval ratings from more than 60 percent of his Arizona constituents and his unfavorable assessments register under ten percent. Remarkably, his positive scores are identical among Democrats and Republicans (67%) and subside only moderately among Independents (61%). Geographically, his favorable scores exceed 60 percent in every region of the state and hit nearly 70 percent in rural Arizona.

U.S. Senator Jon Kyl also enjoys favorable ratings – but at an unmistakably lower level than McCain. Additionally, although Senator Kyl receives positive scores from 62 percent of Republicans, we find that Democrats and Independents are far less supportive: Democrats are 28 percent favorable and Independents 35 percent favorable. Senator Kyl's negative ratings remain low (10%) and rise to only 16 percent among Democrats and 17 percent among Independents.

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EDITOR'S NOTE: This Rocky Mountain Poll Arizona (2004-I-06) is based on 704 telephone interviews with adults, conducted from January 6th through January 12th, 2004 throughout Arizona. In the overall sample, one may say with 95 percent certainty that the results have a statistical precision of plus or minus 3.7 percent of what they would have been had the entire adult population been surveyed. The Rocky Mountain Poll is conducted by the Behavior Research Center of Arizona and is an independent and non-partisan research program.
