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## NAPOLITANO, McCAIN JOB RATINGS HIT RECORD HIGH MARKS

Phoenix, Arizona, February 16, 2005. As Republican "wanna-be" governors stumble over each other to challenge Democrat Governor Janet Napolitano, voters in Arizona appear to be growing more fond of their chief executive. Napolitano's favorable job rating rose to 55 percent in January from 51 percent in October and only 49 percent one year ago January. Those inclined to disapprove of her performance in office shrank to 13 percent from 16 percent in October.

Favorable job ratings for the Governor total 71 percent among Democrats, 41 percent with Republicans and an impressive 63 percent among Independents.

Simultaneously, Republican Senator John McCain is at the top of his popularity with a stunning 73 percent rating his performance as favorable. Barely six percent think he is doing a poor job as U.S. Senator.

Such results would seem to provide some evidence that Arizona voters are able to find some comfort in having major offices held by members of differing political parties. The results are also interesting when compared to the ratings the public gives to the state legislature and U.S. Senator Jon Kyl, both arguably further to the right than either Napolitano or McCain. In the case of the state legislature, favorable job ratings rose to 34 percent in January – roughly comparable to last summer, but definitely superior to those of the past several years. Voters will probably take a serious interest in both the substance and style of what some predict will be a divisive serious run by a very conservative legislature determined to embarrass and weaken Governor Napolitano.

The findings outlined in this report are based on a survey of 703 adults across Arizona conducted between January 4<sup>th</sup> and January 7<sup>th</sup>, 2005, by the Behavior Research Center of Arizona as part of the Center's independent and non-partisan Rocky Mountain Poll series. Senator Jon Kyl is also enjoying some of his best readings – 49 percent favorable to only seven percent unfavorable. Senator Kyl's numbers, while good, lack the bi-partisan tonality of Senator McCain. Thus, while Kyl has solid positive job ratings among Republicans (63%) they soften to 53 percent among Independents and to only 39 percent among Democrats.

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It may also be of interest to some that the more centrist politicians McCain and Napolitano are considerably more popular than the conservative Kyl and the very conservative new state legislature.

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EDITOR'S NOTE: This Rocky Mountain Poll Arizona (2005-I-04) is based on 703 telephone interviews with adults, conducted from January 4<sup>th</sup> through January 7<sup>th</sup>, 2005, throughout Arizona. In the overall sample, one may say with 95 percent certainty that the results have a statistical precision of plus or minus 3.7 percent of what they would have been had the entire adult population been surveyed. The voter segment of the sample includes 540 voters and has an estimated margin of error = /-4.3 percent. The Rocky Mountain Poll is conducted by the Behavior Research Center of Arizona and is an independent and non-partisan research program.
