PRESIDENT BUSH JOB RATINGS HIT HISTORIC LOW IN ARIZONA

Phoenix, Arizona, April 26, 2005. President George W. Bush's job ratings from Arizonans have dropped to their lowest level since he assumed office. The shift toward a critical view of his performance may be an indication that consumers and voters have reached a tipping point in their willingness to support his overall government policies, both domestic and foreign.

On key issues such as the federal deficit, rising health care costs, social security policies and the U.S. balance of trade, close to or more than half of Arizonans rate his performance as "poor." Additionally, there has been a noticeable rise in critical evaluations of his efforts to improve world opinion of the U.S. and of what he has done to devise a good exit strategy for Iraq.

Perhaps most telling, however, is the finding that by 45 percent to 34 percent, Arizonans believe Mr Bush "does not understand the needs of people like themselves". In eleven of 12 policy areas tested, Mr Bush now receives more negative job evaluations than positive ones – including his centerpiece tax reduction policies.

As of the time of this survey, 41 percent of Arizonans rate Mr. Bush's overall performance in the White House favorably, while a near equal percent (38%) say he is doing a poor job. Another 19 percent characterize his performance as only "fair" compared to 16 percent in January.

The findings outlined in this report are based on a survey of 682 adults across Arizona conducted between April 12th and April 17th, 2005, by the Behavior Research Center of Arizona as part of the Center's independent and non-partisan Rocky Mountain Poll series. A key factor in the decline in Mr. Bush's ratings may be that the strong underpinning of support he has long enjoyed as regards his management of the situation in Iraq, appears to be evaporating. In January of 2004, 48 percent of Arizonans have him good marks on this issue, but that figure fell to 43 percent in January of this year and has further eroded to 41 percent today. Simultaneously, the proportion rating his management of the situation in Iraq as "poor", rose from 31 percent in January 2004, to 36 percent in January of 2005 and now sits at 38 percent, the highest to date.

Another interesting aspect of the current survey is that retirees have become among the most negative in their assessment of Bush policies – and particularly so as regards economic issues such as the federal deficit, health care costs, the U.S. balance of trade and the social security system.

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The decline in Mr. Bush's job ratings may be having a negative coat tail effect on the view Arizonans have of their two sitting Republican senators, John McCain and Jon Kyl. In the case of McCain, his overall job ratings remain very favorable, but declined from their historical high of 73 percent in January to 61 percent today. For Jon Kyl, who is up for reelection next year, favorable job ratings dropped to 42 percent from 49 percent and negatives edged up. Senator Kyl's numbers are, nonertheless, four-to-one favorable, but if the President's numbers continue to fall, so might his own.

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EDITOR'S NOTE: This Rocky Mountain Poll Arizona (2005-II-03) is based on 682 telephone interviews with adults, conducted from April 12^{th} through April 17^{th} , 2005, throughout Arizona. In the overall sample, one may say with 95 percent certainty that the results have a statistical precision of plus or minus 3.8 percent of what they would have been had the entire adult population been surveyed. The voter segment of the sample includes 524 voters and has an estimated margin of error +/-4.4 percent. The Rocky Mountain Poll is conducted by the Behavior Research Center of Arizona and is an independent and non-partisan research program.
