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TAXPAYERS GENERALLY HAPPY WITH CITY AND COUNTY GOVERNMENT ALTHOUGH TUCSON APPEARS OFF THE PACE; STATE THOUGHT HEADED IN RIGHT DIRECTION

Phoenix, Arizona, August 11, 2005. Taxpayers in Arizona are generally pleased with their city governments, with positive assessments outweighing negative ones by nearly three to one. On average, only one in every seven rates the performances of city and county government as "poor."

Evaluations vary considerably, however, depending upon which government is bring evaluated. For instance, city governments such as Phoenix, and particularly Tempe, are held in very high regard by their residents, with 52 percent of Phoenix residents, and an impressive 66 percent of Tempe residents, giving their city halls positive ratings. In contrast, favorable ratings drop off noticeably for the City of Tucson (34%) and for Pima County (33%).

Applause registers at lower favorable levels for county government (40%) than for cities (45%). At the same time, however, negative responses average only 13 percent. Maricopa County receives the best overall evaluations.

The findings outlined in this report are based on a survey of 705 adults across Arizona conducted between July 9th and July 16th, 2005, by the Behavior Research Center of Arizona as part of the Center's independent and non-partisan Rocky Mountain Poll series. This survey also updated public views on whether Arizona is headed in the right direction or has gotten seriously off track. In general, "right direction" readings (54%) are nearly twice as high as "off track" readings (29%) and fairly stable compared to April. In general, positive readings have been higher throughout 2005 than at any time since 1999.

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EDITOR'S NOTE: This Rocky Mountain Poll Arizona (2005-III-06) is based on 702 telephone interviews with adults, conducted from July 9th through July 16th, 2005, throughout Arizona. In the overall sample, one may say with 95 percent certainty that the results have a statistical precision of plus or minus 3.8 percent of what they would have been had the entire adult population been surveyed. The Rocky Mountain Poll is conducted by the Behavior Research Center of Arizona and is an independent and non-partisan research program.
