<u>NAPOLITANO – GODDARD JOB PERFORMANCE RATING STABLE –</u> <u>LEGISLATURE DOES ITS ANNUAL OCTOBER DIP</u> <u>McCAIN CONTINUES AS ARIZONA'S MOST POPULAR ELECTED OFFICIAL</u>

Phoenix, Arizona, December 19, 2005. Governor Janet Napolitano and State Attorney Terry Goddard appear to be holding their own in popularity among Arizonans. In contrast, the State Legislature lost some ground, but the dip may be but a cyclical tendency for Arizona to adopt a less generous stance toward the legislature in the fall – public evaluation of the legislature has tended to dip every October for at least the past three years.

Overall, Governor Napolitano's positive job scores rest at 52 percent, compared to only 12 percent in the negative column. The State Legislature's favorable scores fell to 25 percent in October from 34 percent in July, while negative ratings rose to 18 percent from 13 percent.

Attorney General Terry Goddard's ratings softened marginally, but remain five-to-one favorable (42-8%). Goddard appears to be gaining public favor in Arizona's rural counties – holding steady in Pima but losing some ground in Maricopa County.

The findings outlined in this report are based on a survey of 539 voters across Arizona conducted between October 19th and October 28th, 2005, by the Behavior Research Center of Arizona as part of the Center's independent and non-partisan Rocky Mountain Poll series. The survey also explored public job ratings for U.S. Senators John McCain and Jon Kyl. McCain remains extremely popular, with favorable ratings of 60 percent to only seven percent rating him as doing a poor job. Senator Jon Kyl is also well regarded in that his performance ratings are four-to-one favorable, yet noticeably lower than either Napolitano's or McCain's ratings and marginally lower than this summer. Today, 40 percent rate Jon Kyl as doing an "excellent or good" job, while only 10 percent rate his performance as "poor."

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EDITOR'S NOTE: This Rocky Mountain Poll Arizona (2005-IV-XX) is based on 700 telephone interviews with adult heads of household across Arizona, of which, 539 interviews were conducted with registered voters, from October 19th through October 28th, 2005. In the overall sample, one may say with 95 percent certainty that the results have a statistical precision of plus or minus 3.7 percent of what they would have been had the entire voter population been surveyed and plus or minus 4.3 percent of the voter population. The Rocky Mountain Poll is conducted by the Behavior Research Center of Arizona and is an independent and nonpartisan research program.
